These 17 goals, with 169 specific targets, provide a shared blueprint for countries and institutions around the world. India, as a committed member of the global community, began its journey towards the achievement of these goals soon after their inception, focusing on progress that uplifts all sections of society.

Datta Meghe Institute of Higher Education and Research (Deemed to be University) [DMIHER (DU)], recognized among the top 50 Indian universities, has taken proactive steps in aligning its own institutional goals with the global SDGs. With the help of its Prospective Developmental Plan—a five-year roadmap—and its annual Institutional Development Plans, DMIHER (DU) has streamlined its initiatives to support sustainable development across all areas of education, research, and community outreach. DMIHER (DU) has demonstrated a deep commitment to making an impact through its various initiatives. Through its community outreach programs, the university provides health awareness and support services, reaching vulnerable communities and ensuring that no one is left behind. To further support equitable education, the university offers numerous scholarships to deserving students, ensuring financial barriers do not hinder access to quality education. DMIHER (DU) is proud to have a diverse student body, with more than 60% of its students being female, reflecting its commitment to inclusive and quality education for all, particularly the girl child. Gender equality is also evident in the university's workforce, where women hold significant leadership positions, including the Registrar, Controller of Examinations, and various academic roles.

The university is actively engaged in projects related to nutrition, health, and wellbeing, both nationally and internationally, underscoring its dedication to research and innovation in these crucial areas. DMIHER (DU) is committed to clean energy and environmental sustainability, with more than 60% of its energy needs met through renewable sources, such as solar and wind power. A water treatment facility ensures efficient usage and reuse of water, minimizing wastage, while the adoption of over 100 villages allows the university to extend its influence through health care and awareness camps—addressing issues like oral health, tuberculosis, hepatitis, AIDS, cancer, and more.

In pursuit of environmental sustainability, DMIHER (DU) has undertaken major tree plantation drives and organized community awareness campaigns on the importance of clean water, soil, and air. These initiatives are aimed at reducing open defecation and promoting the construction of sanitation facilities, which help improve environmental quality and public health. Additionally, the university supports rural communities in gaining access to affordable and clean drinking water.

The university believes in the importance of lifelong learning and career development. It conducts workshops for faculty, students, and the community, enhancing knowledge and promoting economic growth. With more than 115 granted patents, a robust research and innovation department, and a GMP-certified Ayurveda Lab, DMIHER (DU) contributes significantly to India's economic growth. The university's collaborations with national industries and its state-of-the-art preclinical facility for pharmaceutical trials further demonstrate its commitment to research excellence.

DMIHER (DU) has adopted a sustainable approach to waste management with the establishment of sewage treatment, effluent treatment, and water treatment plants, reducing wastage and promoting sustainable living for all stakeholders—students, faculty, staff, patients, and the community at large. The university ensures that all supplies, including food, are ethically sourced, and it prohibits the use of single-use plastic. Water stations and waste collection bins have been installed across the campus, and a waste management policy is in place to ensure proper disposal and recycling of waste, minimizing the impact on landfills.

To further reduce its carbon footprint, DMIHER (DU) has restricted the use of petrol and diesel vehicles by students, promoting the use of bicycles and electric vehicles instead. Shuttle services are available to encourage the use of eco-friendly transportation. The campus is surrounded by over 200,000 trees, providing a green and healthy environment for all.

1. Introduction

Sustainable Developmental Goal 1, "No Poverty," aims to end poverty in all its forms everywhere by 2030. Poverty reduction is integral to sustainable development, with direct connections to health, education, and economic stability. Achieving this goal enables individuals to live with dignity and access basic needs, such as healthcare, education, and shelter.

In India, poverty alleviation remains a priority with several governmental and institutional initiatives aimed at supporting economically disadvantaged communities. As an institution, DMIHER (DU) is committed to addressing poverty through targeted programs that offer educational, financial, and community support to those in need. DMIHER (DU) undertakes initiatives, from scholarships to health services, that focus on empowering economically disadvantaged students and communities.

2. DMIHER (DU) Initiatives for Poverty Alleviation

DMIHER (DU) has developed numerous support systems to address the needs of low-income students and underprivileged community members, ensuring that financial barriers do not obstruct access to education, healthcare, and essential services.

1) Scholarships and Financial Aid:

- a) Merit-Based and Needs-Based Scholarships: DMIHER (DU) offers various scholarship programs, including the APJ Abdul Kalam Scholarship, Dr. Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan Scholarship, Economically Weaker Sections (EWS) Scholarships, and First-Generation Scholarships. These initiatives provide substantial financial support to students from low-income families, enabling them to pursue higher education without financial strain.
- **b)** Targeted Scholarships for Special Needs: The Women-Only Scholarships, Earn While Learn (EWL) Programs, and Scholarships for Disabled Students further expand inclusivity, addressing specific socio-economic barriers faced by these groups.
- c) Support for Orphaned and Vulnerable Students: DMIHER (DU) provides comprehensive financial support, including full fee waivers, hostel and mess scholarships, and essential study materials, clothes to students from orphanages and underprivileged backgrounds.

2) Providing basic health facilities to low income/ tribal people in underserved areas:

Datta Meghe Institute of Higher Education and Research (DMIHER), in partnership with various minority organizations, to enhance healthcare access in rural Maharashtra. Through targeted health camps and cancer screening programs, these collaborations have aimed to address critical health needs among underserved populations.

3) Digital Access and Resource Sharing:

- **a) Digital Libraries**: To enhance academic access, DMIHER (DU) provides a digital library available 365 days a year, including 24/7 access during exam periods. This resource supports students who may not have personal access to digital devices or learning resources, promoting equitable access to information and technology.
- **b) Book Bank Facility**: DMIHER (DU)'s Book Bank initiative allows students from low-income backgrounds to borrow textbooks and study materials for an academic year. This facility alleviates the financial burden of purchasing books, promoting resource-sharing and sustainability.

Support Systems for Low-Income Students:

- Hostel and Mess Facility: In alignment with the need to support students from the Socially and Economically weaker sections, DMIHER (DU) offers subsidized hostels, mess services, and emergency support resources, including healthcare services.
- Financial Assistance Programs: Through the Earn While Learn initiative, students can financially support themselves during their studies, reducing the risk of poverty-induced dropout.

3. Societal Impact and Assistance

DMIHER (DU) actively participates in poverty reduction efforts by extending services and programs to both students and the surrounding community. The institution's programs are designed to reduce economic hardship and improve quality of life for individuals from vulnerable backgrounds.

- Scholarship Beneficiaries: In 2023, 2794 students benefitted from DMIHER (DU)'s scholarships, receiving tuition fee waivers and financial aid covering hostel and mess fees. These programs directly address educational accessibility and foster career advancement opportunities for economically disadvantaged students.
- Family and Village Adoption Programs: In collaboration with local communities, DMIHER (DU) provides essential healthcare, sanitation, and educational support to families in need. In 2023, this program reached over 3,000 beneficiaries, significantly contributing to improved health and education outcomes for impoverished households.

4. Documentary Records and Photos

Basic Health Facilities to low income/tribal people in underserved areas:

A series of health camps conducted in collaboration with NGOs such as Christian Health Authority of India, Jeevan Vikas Society, and Aga Khan Foundation, spanning regions like Wardha, Gadchiroli, and Yavatmal. A total of 2,910 individuals benefited from these camps, with 283 referred for further treatment. Cancer screenings, particularly for breast and cervical cancers, were also a key focus, reaching additional populations.







1. Introduction

Sustainable Developmental Goal 2, "Zero Hunger," aims to eliminate hunger, achieve food security, and promote sustainable agriculture. Globally, hunger and malnutrition remain critical issues, affecting millions and hindering sustainable development. In India, addressing food security and agricultural sustainability is essential for the overall health and growth of communities.

DMIHER (DU) is actively engaged in contributing to SDG 2 through comprehensive policies, community outreach, and institutional practices that support food security, waste management, sustainable food sourcing, and nutrition programs.

2. DMIHER (DU) Initiatives

I) Student and Staff Mess and canteen Facility

The DMIHER (DU) mess provides nutritious and affordable meals for students, staff, and hospital patients, ensuring all community members have access to essential nutrition. For students facing financial hardship, subsidized meal plans or mess-related scholarships are available to support access to balanced meals.


II) Healthy and Sustainable Food Choices

The mess facilities provide both vegetarian and non-vegetarian options to accommodate cultural and dietary preferences, including international students. DMIHER (DU) mandates that all food is ethically sourced, ensuring that it aligns with

environmental best practices, does not exploit labour, and responsibly sources poultry, fish, and other food items to uphold animal welfare and sustainable agriculture standards.

III) Campus Food Waste Tracking and Management

To minimize waste, DMIHER (DU) has implemented a food waste tracking and management policy across campus facilities, including mess halls, cafeterias, and event spaces. Food waste tracking is displayed daily at the student mess, and students themselves manage this activity to foster a sense of responsibility toward the community and sustainability. The waste is collected by third-party providers who process it for recycling, convert it to compost where possible, and responsibly manage non-recyclable waste in designated landfills.

IV) Community Outreach





1. Introduction

Sustainable Development Goal 3, "Good Health and Well-being," seeks to ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for people of all ages. This is a crucial goal, as good health is foundational to sustainable development and poverty eradication. Addressing health and well-being not only supports economic and social progress but also builds resilience within communities.

At DMIHER (DU), promoting health and well-being within our university community and the broader local region is a core priority. Our health initiatives focus on accessible healthcare, community-based health education, and the cultivation of future healthcare professionals.

2. DMIHER (DU) Initiatives

I) Research Activities

- **a)** DMIHER (DU) actively contributes to health research, producing publications that address crucial health challenges and are viewed extensively by peers and health institutions. Research areas include public health, disease prevention, healthcare access, and clinical innovations.
- **b)** Our research outputs have been referenced in clinical guidance documents, demonstrating their relevance to practical health applications and influence on healthcare practices.
- **c)** Key research topics include infectious disease prevention, mental health, non-communicable diseases, and health systems improvement. Our studies have contributed to understanding health issues both locally and nationally.

II) Health Professionals

- **a)** DMIHER (DU) offers a range of degrees in health-related fields, including Medicine, Nursing, Physiotherapy, Allied Health Sciences, and Public Health. These programs are designed to produce graduates who can meet the healthcare needs of diverse communities.
- **b)** In 2023, a significant proportion of our graduates were from health professions, preparing them to contribute to healthcare systems in both urban and rural areas.

c) Students undergo rigorous academic and clinical training, including simulation-based learning and hands-on community health projects, ensuring they are equipped to address contemporary healthcare challenges.

III) Healthcare Services

- **a)** DMIHER (DU) has established partnerships with national and international health organizations to improve health outcomes and enhance healthcare delivery. These collaborations include projects focused on disease prevention, patient safety, and health systems strengthening.
- **b)** We conduct numerous outreach programs to promote health in the local community, targeting issues such as nutrition, family planning, sports, hygiene, and aging well. These programs include regular health camps, awareness campaigns, and vaccination drives, especially in rural and underserved areas.

IV) Mental and Emotional Health Support

- **a)** Mental health is a priority at DMIHER (DU), with support services available for students and staff. Counselling services, workshops, and awareness campaigns are regularly organized to promote mental well-being, reduce stigma, and support those in need.
- **b)** DMIHER (DU) has a strict smoke-free policy, ensuring that all indoor and outdoor spaces are free from tobacco use. This policy aims to promote a healthy environment and aligns with national regulations on tobacco control.

3. Societal Impact and Assistance

- a) During the period, the university's colleges and hospital conducted 281 healthcare camps across the region, providing medical check-ups and consultations for vulnerable populations, addressing their health needs, and enhancing overall community well-being.
- b) Preventive health campaigns were organized, focusing on communicable diseases, cancer awareness, lifestyle-related conditions, and maternal and child health services. These programs improved health outcomes, promoted early childhood development, and encouraged preventive healthcare practices.
- c) Specialized camps focused on critical areas such as nutrition, oral and dental hygiene, women's health, AIDS awareness, cancer prevention, and anti-tobacco education. These initiatives raised awareness and promoted healthier lifestyle choices among the community.
- d) Collectively, these efforts significantly enhanced health literacy, provided essential support to underserved communities, and strengthened the regional healthcare system while fostering a healthier and more informed society.
- e) With over 1000 students, staff, and community members benefiting from mental health services, DMIHER (DU) is building a culture of mental well-being that extends beyond the campus.




1. Introduction

This testing covers all water sources used across campus, including in colleges, hospitals, and residential facilities, ensuring that clean, safe, and affordable drinking water is accessible to all. The university also collaborates with external testing facilities to validate its internal testing accuracy. Any detected deviations from industry standards prompt immediate corrective action to maintain high-quality water standards.
- **b)** Sustainable Water Management Practices: The university has implemented a range of water-conscious practices across its infrastructure. Buildings incorporate efficient plumbing fixtures to minimize water wastage, and landscaping features plants that require minimal watering. These standards reduce overall water usage on campus and contribute to environmental sustainability by conserving local water resources.

c) Provision of Free Drinking Water: Ensuring access to clean drinking water is a priority at DMIHER (DU). The university provides free, purified drinking water through multiple drinking water stations located across campus. - **c)** DMIHER (DU) has been a pioneer in fostering innovative solutions for sustainable development through its flagship program, "ImpactSpark." This initiative engages students, faculty, and local communities to ideate, prototype, and implement sustainable practices.

The "Reel Making" competition under ImpactSpark has been instrumental in addressing critical water conservation challenges. Solutions like rainwater harvesting, greywater recycling, and efficient irrigation systems have been conceptualized, with practical applications ensuring the sustainable management of water resources. Additionally, the

development of Affordable Drinking Water Stations throughout the campus and the promotion of low-flow water fixtures underscore DMIHER (DU)'s commitment to clean water.
















Solar Power Generation at DMIHER DU



Bylaw No. 22 of 2005

PREAMBLE: -

The Department of Human Resource Development, Government of India, on the recommendation of the University Grants Commission (UGC) has accorded the status of a Deemed to be University to Datta Meghe Institute of Higher Education & Research, Sawangi (Meghe) Wardha hitherto known as Datta Meghe Institute of Medical Sciences (Deemed to be University) for the faculties namely the Faculty of Medical Sciences, Faculty of Dental Sciences, Faculty of Ayurvedic Sciences, Faculty of Nursing Sciences, Faculty of Physiotherapy, Faculty of Interdisciplinary Sciences, Faculty of Allied Health Sciences, Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences, Faculty of Science and Technology, Faculty of Liberal arts, Humanities & Social Sciences, Faculty of Commerce & Management Sciences, Faculty of Engineering and Technology.

The Degrees, Diplomas and the certificate courses of Datta Meghe Institute of Higher Education & Research, (Deemed to be University) Sawangi (Meghe) Wardha shall have the same status as of those given by any Statutory University duly recognized by the University Grant Commission. (UGC).

1. This Bye Law shall be called as the 'BYLAW GOVERNING DEFINING THE CONDITIONS OF SERVICE OF THE EMPLOYEES OF THE UNIVERSITY'.

Provided further that nothing contained in Bylaw shall have the effect of altering the provisions of any special law, rules or regulations for the time being in force in India.

2. It shall come into force with effect from the date of the approval by the Board of Management or such date as may be decided to be so by it.



The University's Research & Development Cell has made a significant impact, having developed a creative, supportive and conducive environment for research amongst the students and faculties of all constituent colleges. Established as the unified advanced research cell having all major facilities under one roof. The budget allocation and seedgrants have been increased for students, doctoral and postdoctoral fellows, and research awards leading to anincrease in quality and the number of research projects and publications in peer-reviewed journals. There has been a significant increase in ICMR - Short Term Studentships, ICMR PG thesis support. R&D to promote good publication practices and research, our material is thoroughly checked for plagiarismusing industrystandard software such as Turnitin for enforcement of similarity checks. Bio-ethics practices were enhanced through the establishment of the UNESCO ethics unit which has enhanced the research aptitude across faculties. In collaboration with IIT-Mumbai, IIT-Kharagpur, IISc Bangalore & VNIT, Nagpur in the field of bioengineering and medical device innovation. This has lead to the establishment of a center like NEWGEN INNOVATION & ENTREPRENEURSHIP DEVELOPMENT CENTER (New Gen IEDC), under the aegis of the National Science & Technology Entrepreneurship Development Board (NSTEDB) DST, the Govt. of India, the BETIC Innovation Cell, the Institutional Innovation Council recognized by the Innovation cell, MHRD to promote innovations in medical technology and health care. The Molecular Biology and Epidemiology Laboratory provides state of the art facilities for molecular research. Incorporation of the global health perspective with social innovation support by the SILICE project & Enprenindia project (Erasmus+,EU) by a consortium of 14 higher education institutions across 5 countries and partnering with academia, industries and NGOs. Consultancy and collaboration have had a significant impact and have led to many interdisciplinary, multidisciplinary, and translational researches. The consortium with national and international bodies for global health like the South Asia Infant Feeding Research Network (SAIFRN), the Global Consortium for Public Health and Research (GCPHR) has been formed which has led to joint publications, joint conferences/workshops, an increase in student and faculty exchange programs, joint grant submissions, and knowledge exchanges. Incentives, training on research methodology, and advanced statistics have led to an increase in high-quality peer-reviewed publications in International reputed databases and 3 electronic databases (Scopus, PubMed, Web of Sciences). The significant achievement of publications per year in the International database is at par with the best institutes and universities in the country, there has also been a noted increase in copyright and patent filing, publications & grants. The special focus on enhancing facilities for grant submission, collaboration has led to enrichment and increase in the number of grant submissions, including joint grant submissions with reputed universities like Harvard University (USA), University of Sydney (Australia), Sheffield University (UK), Bournemouth University (UK), Liverpool John-Moores University (UK), Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI).


1. Introduction

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








General Waste Tracking on Daily Basis





While DMIHER is situated in a region with limited direct interaction with large aquatic ecosystems, the university recognizes the importance of contributing to aquatic conservation goals through sustainable practices, education, and awareness initiatives. Our efforts are cantered around promoting water conservation, reducing river pollution, and enhancing community awareness on the importance of protecting aquatic life.

2. DMIHER Initiatives

a) River Cleaning Campaigns

 drives are organized to remove any residual waste and idols from the rivers,
 ensuring minimal impact on the aquatic environment.
- c) Water Treatment and Reuse Facility: DMIHER has established a water treatment facility on campus that enables the reuse of treated water for non-potable tasks, such as irrigation and campus maintenance. This initiative reduces fresh water consumption and demonstrates sustainable water practices that indirectly support nearby water bodies by conserving resources.
- **d) Watershed and Rainwater Management:** With limited natural water bodies nearby, DMIHER focuses on rainwater harvesting and watershed management within the campus. These initiatives help conserve water, reduce dependency on external sources, and support sustainable water management in the region.

b) Expertise Sharing:






